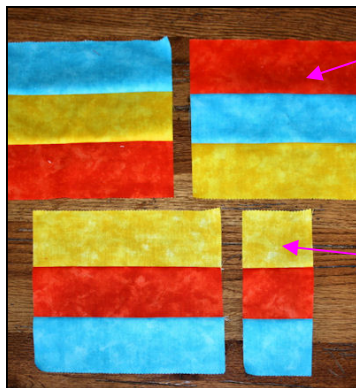

### Strip Quilting Image

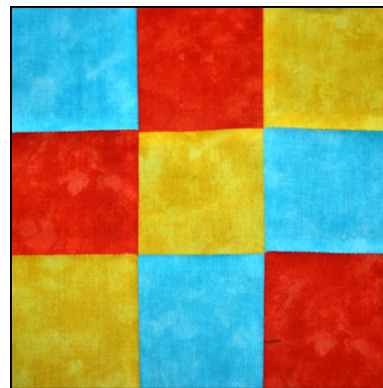


Strip piecing is also known as chain-piecing. You sew your fabric pieces together in a long chain, without lifting your presser foot, until you've finished your chains. Once you've finished a chain, you cut the pieces apart, press, and start striping again with the next step!

### Strip Quilting a Nine-Patch Block



Sew strips of fabric together, making sure they are equal width, in whatever pattern you'd like. Then, cut a strip from the pieced strips equal in width to the width of one of your strips: i.e if your strips are 2 1/5" wide, your cut will be 2 1/2" wide.



Finally, sew those strips together to create a Nine-Patch block!

### Strip Quilting a Contemporary Bar Quilt



This Contemporary Bar quilt was made with Moda Jelly Roll (2 1/2" wide) strips of fabric. Each strip was cut 9 1/2" in length, then the strips were sewn together to make a vertical row, using a strip-piecing method (i.e never lifting the presser foot, just sewing strip after strip together until they were all sewn). Each strip seam on the back was then pressed to the darkest fabric and the two stripped rows were squared up so they matched. Three strips of the purple sashing/border fabrics were cut to-size and sewed to the bars, and then the top and bottom purple fabric was added.

This is a great type of quilt to make with not just Jelly Roll fabrics, but also with scraps and your stash. Just remember to sew the strips in opposite directions, to reduce a bow in your strips (especially important on longer strips or rows).
